

Regenerative Therapy: Q&A with Linda Black

San Diego, California-based Gallant is developing ready-to-use stem cell therapies that reduce inflammation, help restore function and fit seamlessly into everyday practice. Its first product – for refractory Feline Chronic Gingivostomatitis (FCGS) – is on track for FDA conditional approval in early 2026. Gallant CEO Linda Black, DVM, PhD, recently responded to some questions about stem cell therapy from Fountain Report.

Fountain Report: What is regenerative therapy?

Linda Black: By definition, regenerative medicine is a branch of medicine focused on repairing, replacing and regenerating tissues to restore or establish normal function. The field is rapidly growing and contains several categories of innovation, including gene therapy, tissue engineering and cell-based therapies, of which pluripotent stem cells and mesenchymal stem cells – also called mesenchymal stromal cells (MSCs) – are common examples.

- With fewer follow-ups and less reliance on chronic medications, stem cell therapy offers a potentially more affordable option – and the possibility of improved longterm health.

Immunomodulation is a fundamental principle of regenerative medicine and refers to the enhancement or suppression of immune cells and overall restoration of immune balance. These functions often result in reduced inflammation and pain. Regenerative medicine strategies have the potential to truly heal tissue rather than simply manage symptoms, allowing patients to not only feel better but actually get better.

The "new way" of stem cell therapy involves using allogeneic cells from a healthy donor. These therapies are ready-to-use and can be available on demand once FDA-approved. Harvested from FDA-qualified, healthy donors and manufactured in GMP-compliant labs, they are shipped frozen and can be thawed and administered as needed. Gallant uses uterinederived MSCs to create allogeneic, ready-to-use therapies.

Fountain Report: To what extent is regenerative therapy being used today in human or veterinary medicine?

Linda Black: In human clinical medicine, MSCs have been studied in clinical trials for many inflammatory and degenerative conditions. The first-ever FDA approval of an allogeneic stem cell therapy in human medicine occurred last December. That therapy, Mesoblast's RYONCIL®, marked a historic milestone. Gallant is on the verge of a similar breakthrough in veterinary medicine.

In companion animals, autologous (i.e., the donor is the recipient) and allogeneic (healthy donor from same species) stem cell therapies are being explored across a range of conditions,

autologous therapies, which are cumbersome, expensive and out of reach for many practices. Gallant is solving that accessibility gap with a pipeline of readyto-use, allogeneic stem cell therapies targeting some of the most common and underserved diseases in pets. The pipeline includes FCGS, canine and feline OA, canine atopic dermatitis and feline CKD.

Fountain Report: Whom do you envision administering regenerative therapy to companion animals?

Linda Black: All veterinarians can administer allogeneic stem cell therapies, because they are delivered just as any slow IV injection – no specialized equipment or training required.

Fountain Report: Can you address the issue of cost? How accessible will regenerative therapy be for pet owners?

Linda Black: Allogeneic stem cell therapy will be no higher in cost than commonly used treatments, and in many cases, may cost less. For example, chronic treatment with NSAIDs, monoclonal antibodies or cyclosporine can cost \$60 to \$200 per month indefinitely and often requires ongoing bloodwork to assess systemic side effects to the medications. In contrast, Gallant's stem cell therapy typically involves just two injections, spaced two weeks apart. With fewer followups and less reliance on chronic medications, it offers a practical, potentially more affordable option – and the possibility of improved longterm health for the pets we care for.

Stem cell therapies can also be incorporated with other therapies and should not be considered an "instead-of" or "last resort" option. On the contrary, earlier treatment with MSCs may reduce inflammation and promote tissue repair, helping to slow or prevent disease progression.


Avoided and delayed care

Cost is a major barrier to veterinary care. A 2025 Gallup–PetSmart Charities study revealed that 52% of U.S. pet owners skipped or declined veterinary care in the past year, with 71% citing cost as the primary reason.

Access is another problem.
In many parts of the country,
especially rural areas, veterinary
care is hard to come by. Even in
more densely populated regions,

many clinics are overburdened. The U.S. faces a projected veterinarian shortage of up to 15,000 by 2030, according to Mars Veterinary Health. Shortages of support personnel pushes the number even higher, to an estimated 60,000 total staff needed (Veterinary Care Accessibility Project). These shortages are resulting in long wait times, reduced availability and more pet owners left with no options when they need care most.

closed, booked up, or when pet owners face hurdles like work, transportation or uncertainty about whether something is serious. Most pet owners actually prefer to start virtually. In fact, a 2024 study found that 91.9% of pet owners with a regular vet would use tools like chat or phone calls if they were available.¹ And when virtual care is offered at nominal or no cost, they're more likely to check in about small changes that could signal something bigger.

Virtual care offers triage, advice and direction when clinics are closed, booked up, or when pet owners face hurdles like work, transportation or uncertainty about whether something is serious. Most pet owners actually prefer to start virtually.

Virtual care isn't a relief valve.

In-person veterinary care is about more than just making a diagnosis. It draws on all the senses—sight, touch, smell, even the intuition that's developed through years of experience. It helps build strong relationships, supports ongoing care and often uncovers issues that might otherwise go unnoticed.

However, not every concern needs hands-on care. Without virtual care as a starting point, we're adding pressure to an already stretched system.

That means better chances for early detection. Frequent use of veterinary triage has been shown to increase health literacy, which increases the odds for early detection and better overall care for our pets.

An integrated approach that brings together virtual and inperson care makes it easier for pet owners to stay engaged and get the right care at the right time, supporting better outcomes for both pets and providers.

What a seamless system looks like

In an ideal world, every pet owner would have insurance, disposable

income, nearby clinics with open appointments, and the time and knowledge to navigate every health concern. But that world doesn't exist for most. By expanding our models to include virtual access, we can bring access, choice and affordability to a market starving for all three.

Imagine a care model where a pet owner can start with a telehealth triage quickly, affordably and without logistical hurdles. Based on the assessment, they might receive advice, monitoring instructions or a referral for inperson care. Records are shared across platforms so all providers, virtual or in-clinic, are informed. This is integrated care.

The bottom line

Virtual and in-person care should not be in competition. They serve different but complementary purposes. When used together, they increase access, reduce unnecessary visits and ultimately improve outcomes. For many pet owners, virtual care isn't a convenience, it's the only door open. It's time to stop debating whether it belongs in veterinary care models and start designing the pathways that work better for all of us.










Monthly Hospital Vaccine, Supplies and Parasiticides Purchasing Trends

For the month ending **July 31, 2025**, year over year reporting showed mixed results among the respective categories across the 32,000+ practices and shelter locations in the Animalytix Marketplace.

Core & Lifestyle Canine & Feline Vaccine practice purchase spending indices were at +0.9% growth YTD nationally through the end of the month. Purchases of Surgical Suite consumables, which serve as a proxy for the incidence of surgical procedures, were at +0.3% growth YTD. Chronic Care products were +2.5% growth YTD. Growth in Kennel Cough vaccine purchases were at +0.9% YTD. Overall spending growth for Parasiticide were at (-0.9%) growth YTD.

It also codifies that these individuals have passed their Veterinary Technical National Exam, earning their CVT license. **Around Ptown**

4.2 Canada's top dog, cat breeds

Online pet marketplace Rover released its seventh annual Top Pet Breeds Report for Canada. Among dogs, non-designer mixed breeds claimed the top spot, followed by the Golden Retriever, Labrador Retriever, Goldendoodle and German Shepherd. The Miniature Poodle is Canada's fastest-growing dog breed. 5.1 Retail beef prices hit new record, and consumers keep buying

Consumers are showing no signs of sticker shock when it comes to beef demand despite the fact that

retail beef prices for July closed in on \$9 per pound, a sharp increase from the prior month. Market experts attribute the continuing demand for beef to genetic improvements which upgrade the eating experience, the current protein craze and a strong general economy. **Drovers**

5.2 Misdiagnosing brucellosis can increase incidence by millions

Brucellosis is a serious, often neglected disease endemic to many low- and middle-income countries. But its symptoms mimic malaria, typhoid, or even food poisoning, leading to missed diagnoses, according to researchers at Texas A&M College of Veterinary Medicine & Biomedical Sciences. Malaria is caused by parasites spread through mosquitoes while brucellosis is caused by bacteria spread through major livestock species. **Texas A&M University**

5.3 222 poultry facilities recognized for exceptional safety performance

The Joint Poultry Industry Safety & Health Council recognized 222 chicken and turkey facilities with safety awards this month at the National Safety Conference for the Poultry Industry in Destin, Florida. The facilities were recognized for implementing innovative and effective employee safety and health programs. Awards were based on injury statistics from 2022–2024 and a review of written applications.

5.4 USDA cuts 2025 pork production forecast amid PRRS outbreaks

A sluggish slaughter rate and a drop in dressed weights for the second half of the year has pushed 2025 pork production down 1% from the July forecast to 27.7 billion pounds. USDA economists Mildred Haley and Adriana Valcu-Lisman attribute the reduction in hog numbers to unusually high rates of porcine reproductive and respiratory syndrome in the second

quarter, continuing into June.

5.5 Whitewater Processing breaks ground on turkey plant in Indiana

5.6 HHS allows FDA emergency use of animal drugs to combat NWS

The U.S. Department of Health and Human Services has allowed the FDA to issue Emergency Use Authorizations (EUAs) for animal drugs to treat or prevent New World Screwworm (NWS). Currently, there are no FDA-approved drugs for NWS in the United States. With an EUA, the FDA authorizes the use of animal drugs that may be approved for other purposes, or available in other countries.

5.7 US veterinarians join effort to aid honey bees

Unlike with other livestock such as cattle and poultry, veterinarians in the U.S. have not historically been part of honey bee care, as they have in Mexico and Europe. It's easy to get veterinarians comfortable prescribing antibiotics for hives, said Meghan Milbrath, a beekeeper and assistant professor of apiculture at Michigan State University. The

bigger obstacle is training them to apply their expertise to be of service to beekeepers. **VIN News Service**

5.8 Widespread outbreaks of African swine fever continue

African swine fever has expanded its geographical range, according to the World Organization for Animal Health. From Jan. 1, 2024, to May 25, 2025, the WOAH received reports from 51 countries and territories, reporting a total of 14,918 outbreaks. Three countries reported the first occurrence of ASF during 2024: Montenegro, Albania and Sri Lanka. Significant spread occurred in Bhutan, Côte d'Ivoire, Germany and Poland. The Pig Site

5.9 Zimbabwe bans livestock movement due to FMD outbreak

In response to a rapidly spreading Foot and Mouth Disease (FMD) outbreak, the Zimbabwe government imposed an immediate, nationwide ban on all livestock movement. The measure coincides with the dispatch of 300,000 free vaccines to high-risk zones and aims to prevent a similar crisis in neighboring South Africa. Zimbabwe is pursuing a strategy to expand its cattle herd to 11 million over the next decade. **Zimbabwe Situation**

5.10 Manitoba planning emergency response to African swine fever

Manitoba has issued a request for proposals for emergency response plans for an African swine fever outbreak which could involve the culling and disposal of hundreds of thousands of pigs. An ASF outbreak in Canada would lead to border

closures at a cost to the Manitoba swine sector of \$1.2 billion in lost farm and processing revenue over three months. The province is looking for collaboration from Alberta, Saskatchewan, Ontario and Quebec. **CBC**

5.11 Data, logistics planning for livestock truck routes can reduce risk of infection

Researchers from North Carolina State University reported that using data to reroute trucks that transport feed and livestock between pig farms and from farms to market could reduce up to 42% of the contacts between infected and uninfected farms via vehicle movements. Researchers used data about which farms had an illness outbreak, as well as when vehicles were traveling to cleaning and disinfection (C&D) stations.
